BA (Hons) Sculpture – 2011

Welcome to Camberwell College of Arts and to the BA (Hons) Sculpture course, which you will be starting this October.

The first day will **be Monday October 3rd**; we will all meet at **11am** on the 4th floor main sculpture studio of Peckham Road.

You will be welcomed into the department and given an induction into the course ethos and structure then shown around the department and facilities. You will also be given an initial timetable for the first 5 week period in term 1 at your enrolment but a more detailed timetable for the year ahead will be available at the **Monday 3rd** meeting and on google calendar.

On **Tuesday 4th**th we will meet at **10am** in the sculpture studios; you will be introduced to the regular tutors, briefed on the initial 5 week studio project and in the afternoon you will all install your most recent work for review- see the Summer project enclosed.

On **Wednesday October 5th** at **10am** we will all meet at the **Saatchi gallery** to discuss your research on the 2 questions in the summer project- see enclosed.

On **Thursday 6**th at **10am** we will all meet again in the studios to initiate the studio project and begin part 1 of the introduction to the workshops.

On **Friday 7**th you will have your first Contextual Studies seminar with Paul OKane at **10am**.

Inductions for the fabrication workshops will begin in week 2 on **Monday 10th October** as the studio project starts and will happen every subsequent Monday until Monday October 31st. A detailed timetable for these workshops will be available in the first week of term.

SCULPTURE Summer Project

<u>Part 1</u>

To prepare you for the course and to give you some basic understanding of contemporary art theory we have <u>two</u> questions for you to investigate over the summer which are based around the new art show "**The shape of things to come' part 1** at the **Saatchi gallery** and the publication of a new sculpture book: "**The shape of things to come'-** see reading list below.

You can visit the Saatchi website over the summer (and if you have the opportunity please visit the gallery) to see the range of works and begin your research: <u>http://www.saatchi-gallery.co.uk/artists/sculpture/</u>

At your enrolment day you will be asked to visit the Saatchi gallery show (if you haven't already and which is free) before we meet for the day at the gallery on **October 5th** to experience the works together.

You will then present your findings on **October 5th** at the gallery to the other first years and your tutors in the form of an open discussion.

The readings for the questions are detailed below and should not take you more than <u>4</u> <u>hours</u>. All the books listed are widely available from Amazon and other good bookshops and online sellers and much information can be found online.

The two questions refer to 2 significant conceptual developments in contemporary art and culture that will figure largely in your studies.

1. What is Modernism?

You will want to consider in your research:

- What is the period of modernism?
- What are the characteristics of the modernist period?

Please choose 3 sculptors, as examples, that in your mind typify or illustrate the ideals of <u>Modernism</u>.

Provide an image (A4 size) of each of the artists you have chosen for the discussion on October 6th.

2. What is Post-modernism?

You will want to consider in your research:

- what defines this cultural change?
- why is it considered different to Modernism?

Please choose 3 sculptors from the Saatchi gallery show "**The shape of things to come**' who are <u>born after 1960</u> as examples that in your mind <u>typify</u> or <u>reject</u> the ideals of <u>Post-Modernism</u>.

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You may find it helpful to consider if the artists born after 1960 have the same agenda as artists born before 1960!

- Make brief <u>notes</u> about your findings to help you discuss your thoughts and observations which you can then share in the discussion at the gallery
- To help your research you will find the book 'Art in Theory' by Harrison and Wood invaluable, and the book 'The Shape of Things to Come' and website for the Saatchi gallery

SUMMER PROJECT PART 2

On **Tuesday 4**th you must bring in a piece of your most recent work and install it in the studio to discuss as a group later in the week. The work can be a drawing or if the work is too big to bring along then please bring a print out or photo of the work (minimum size A4 or bigger) or sculpture(s) of any size; the only criteria is that whatever you bring must be the most recent thing you have made.
