Themes:

- Duality of human nature
- Friendship/curiosity → drives the plot forward
- Science and the unexplained
- Religion
- Reputation/appearance → Victorian values
- Hypocrisy
- Silence/secrecy refusal to reveal? Cannot reveal? Blackmail, shock etc.
- Urban terror link between Victorian London and horrors
- Darwinism/devolution
- Freudian concepts: battle between ID (Hyde) and superego (Jekyll)
- Suppression → Violence
- Beast within man (innate evil)
- Good vs. evil

Context:

- Robert Louis Stevenson
 - o Health problems
 - o Born in Edinburgh into rich family
- Two sides:
 - o London/Edinburgh: respectable side vs. dodgy side
 - o Burke and Hare: navvies by day, body snatchers by night
 - Jack the Ripper: murdered/mutilated prostitutes rumoured respectable by day, killer by night
- Darwin: SIMILAR TO JEKYYL (SCIENTIST DISCOVERS SOMETHING CONTROVERSIAL)
 - Descent of Man and Origin of Species
 - Proposed controversial theory of evolution which was outrageous to most religious
 Victorians
 - Hyde is presented as an ape-like man (troglodytic/bestial terms)
 - Because Jekyll devolves into him, idea that if man evolved from ape, can there be an Hyde-like animal within us \rightarrow beast within man
- Victorian Age and Values:
 - o Civilised/reputable/repressed
 - Industrial Revolution period of rapid change → fear of the unknown = RLS uses this
 to inflict fear
 - Reputation and status is priority → society based off appearance

Gothic novel: MODERN

- No reader distance from the horrors → FEAR
- Draw on science rather than superstition \rightarrow MORE BELIEVABLE \rightarrow FEAR
- Draw on the possible rather than the absurd (monsters) → TRUE FEAR
- Emphasis of horror IN us/rather than in a distant place (externally)

Some important quotes:

Hypocrisy:

- "No gentleman but wishes to avoid a scene...name your figure"
- "if your master has fled or is dead, we may at least save his credit"
- "men before hired bravos to transact their crimes"
- Jekyll = "a man who could afford to laugh at suspicion"
- Utterson meant to be "last good influence of downgoing men" → DOESN'T HELP JEKYLL

Science:

- Lanyon: "Such unscientific balderdash" → contrasting views yet an "inseparable friend" seen as "hidebound pedant"
- "transcendental medicine" → the science of the supernatural

Religion:

- "Pious work...annotated with startling blasphemies"
- Hyde is "staggering the unbelief of Satan"
- "read the signature of Satan"

Jekyll:

- "fond of the respect of the wise"
- "such irregularities as I was guilty of...hid them with sense of shame"
- "I felt younger, lighter happier"
- "shook the doors of the prisonhouse of my disposition"
- "strip off these lendings, and spring into a sea of liberty"
- "greedy gusto"

Suppression:

• "my devil had been long caged, he came out roaring" → consequences of suppression

Duality:

- "man is not truly one, but truly two"
- "primitive duality of man"
- "all human beings are commingled out of good and evil"

Main characters:

• Gabriel Utterson: HYPOCRISY/REPUTATION/SECRECY

- Prominent and well respected lawyer
- Reserved, dignified → presents traditional Victorian society
- Narrator of story

• Dr Henry Jekyll: DUALITY/MODERN SCIENCE/FREUDIAN CONCEPTS

- o Respected doctor and friend of Utterson and Lanyon
- o Modern scientist who explores the "transcendental medicine"
- \circ Wants to explore the two sides of man \rightarrow good and evil
- o "all human beings are commingled out of good and evil"
- o "fond of the respect of the wise"

• Mr Edward Hyde: DUALITY/FREUDIAN CONCEPTS/DARWINISM/EVIL/BEAST WITHIN MAN

- Violent and cruel → absolute evil → ugly and deformed
- o Released from the bonds of conscience and separated from Jekyll
- o "Smaller and younger", "hissing", "snarled",
- "like some damned Juggernaut"
- o "troglodyte/troglodytic", "ape like fury", "like a rat", "like a monkey", "mere animal terror"

• Dr Hastle Lanyon: TRADITIONALIST/VICTORIAN/SCIENCE

- Reputable doctor friend of Utterson and Jekyll
- o Embodiment of rationalism and materialism
- DEATH REPRESENTS VICTORY OF SUPERNATURALISM over MATERIALISM → emphasising power of the unknown (horror)

- "haunting sense of deformity" → [Hyde description]

- "Lanyon declared himself a doomed man" → [given up after meeting with Hyde with no explanation → forebodes evil]
- "I regard [Jekyll] as dead" → [Lanyon too scared to meet him]
- "three very old friends" → FRIENDSHIP
- "I cannot tell you" → SECRECY → build tension
- "accursed topic" → EVIL
- "life of extreme seclusion" → SECRECY/DUALITY
- "If I am the chief of sinners, I am the chief of sufferers" → DUALITY

Chapter 7 quotes: [INCIDENT AT THE WINDOW]

- "premature twilight" → [setting]
- "disconsolate prisoner" → [Jekyll description] → trapped by evil Hyde
